

Africa At A Glance

"AFRICA TODAY" TELECAST

Boston (ANP)—A six-week television series, entitled "Africa Today," and featuring the Boston University African Studies Program, began last Dec. 14 over WHDH-TV's "Impact" segment of the Dateline Boston show. The program, seen each Thursday evening until January 18, examines the dynamics of the changing African continent, the nation-building now in progress, African relationships with the rest of the world, and the forces and drives shaping Africa's political and economic future. Regular participants on the program are two South African-born faculty members of Boston University, Prof. Jeffrey Butler and research associate Violaine Junod.

PSYCHIATRIC MEET IN JANUARY

Abokuta, Nigeria (ANP)—The first meeting of the recently formed Association of Psychiatrists in Africa will be held at the Neuro-Psychiatric Center, Aro Hospital in Abokuta in January. The association, first of its kind in Africa, includes in its membership all psychiatrists working or living in Africa.

17 FRENCH-SPEAKING NATIONS INVITED TO WORLD BANK INSTITUTE

Washington (ANP)—A special course on development problems for senior official from under-developed countries in French-speaking areas around the globe is to be held at the World Bank's Economic Development Institute next June and July. Invited to participate will be representatives of the Cameroon Congo (Brazzaville) and Congo (Leopoldville), Dahomey, Ethiopia, Haiti, Ivory Coast, Lagos, Lebanon, Malagasy, Morocco, Senegal, Syria, Togo, Tunisia, Vietnam and the French Republic (for Overseas Departments).

FORMAL OPENING

Addis Ababa (ANP)—The formal opening of Kenya House, a club designed for cultural contacts between Kenyans and Ethiopians was held recently in Addis Ababa. It is the second such bi-national club to be opened within the past three months, the first being the Beit-el-Sudan.

NEW AIRPORT TO HAVE LONGEST RUNWAY

Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia (ANP)—Malaya's new airport, currently under construction 12 miles west of Kuala Lumpur, will have the longest runway in Southeast Asia when completed in August, 1963. Its length will be 12,000 feet. Expected to be serviceable in August, 1963, it will be fully completed by March, 1964, and will be the most modern in design.

EARLY AFRICAN ART ON DISPLAY

Chicago (ANP)—An exhibit of early African art is currently on display at the Chicago Natural History Museum. The exhibit is entitled "Prehistoric Art of the Libyan Sahara, and is composed of paintings which reproduce, to scale, the Neolithic Age rock paintings and carvings recently uncovered in Africa.

MANAGEMENT SEMINAR

Addis Ababa (ANP)—A seminar on advanced management, arranged by the Imperial Ethiopian Institute of Public Relations, is to convene in Addis Ababa on January 8. Purpose of the seminar will be to discuss and exchange ideas and views on basic administrative problems.

Focus On Africa

ALLEGATIONS BY the Ghana government that neighboring Togo had subversive contacts with political refugees from Ghana have been denied by President Sylvanus Olympio. The Togo president said his government had merely granted the refugees political asylum. The Ghana government said that recent waves of strikers and bombings in Ghana were part of an opposition party plot to seize power with the help of the army and support from the Republic of Togo.

It added in a white paper that it has evidence that secret oaths were taken to assassinate President Kwame Nkrumah and a number of his ministers. But for the discovery, said the government, bombings would have continued through the recent visit of Queen Elizabeth II. The statement charged persons ranging from market women to some of Ghana's most prominent politicians were involved in the conspiracy.

MEANWHILE, IN TOGO, Theophile Mally, Togolese minister for the interior, declared that two commando leaders responsible for carrying out the plot against President Olympio received 15,000 pounds (about 420,000 dollars) from the Ghana government and were trained in the Volta Region of Ghana. The reported plot took place early in December. At least 46 persons were arrested. He claimed that the "Juvento" movement and the Togolese Progress Party, both financed by the Ghana government, were responsible for "this odious plot" which nearly cost the life of the president and his ministers. He said the Ghanaian white paper was merely a camouflage to hide the plot against Togo, Mally added that the culprits could not expect a pardon, saying the supreme penalty would be carried out.

SHORTLY AFTER handbills appeared called for "sabotage against government installations," a series of explosions hit South Africa. The blasts were believed to have been set off by new African underground organizations protesting the government's harsh racial segregation policies. Among the places hit were a suburban post-office, several African affairs offices, and an electric power station, mainly around Johannesburg and Port Elizabeth.

NEW YORK — You can get something out of nothing — if you work at it hard enough. The steel industry has achieved this rare accomplishment by converting a drab waste product — slag — into basic raw materials for other industries.

Steelways, official publication of American Iron and Steel Institute, said that modern steelmen, blending science with a knack for sales, have found so many valued uses for this by-product that slag has risen from the dumps to enviable stockpile status.

Slag is produced during the refining process of iron and steel. It occurs because many impurities in iron ore will not melt in the furnace without chemical assistance.

The assistance is provided by fluxes, the basic one being limestone. The limestone combines chemically with the impurities to form a scum or slag. This floats to the top of the molten metal. When the furnaces are flushed or tapped, the slag is diverted to dumps, or nowadays to processing plants, where it cools and solidifies.

Steelways said that this former waste product now "probably surrounds you." It noted that about 80 per cent of the mineral rock wool for home and industrial wall insulation utilizes slag.

THE ANSWER

St. Francis of Assisi, hoeing his garden, was asked what he would do if he were suddenly to learn that he was to die at sunset that day. He said:

"I would finish hoeing my garden."
This seems to me an answer to all the troubled young people these days who are beginning life in a world that appears to hold no security for them or for anyone, young or old.
Why should they bother to go to college when the atom war is just around the corner? Why should a young wife have a baby when over the ceiling may collapse on its crib? Why should one paint a picture or write a song or begin a novel? We can't be sure of anything, these young people say, not now, or next year or the year after that. Why should we try to make a life for ourselves, they ask. Why should we go to classes or take examinations or get married or look for an apartment or try for a job? Next spring, or some spring too frighteningly near, it may all go, the life we have begun. Our world is in deadly peril, we have lost the promise of tomorrow.
St. Francis put the answer in a simple metaphor: go on hoeing your garden. The task is still here—the house to build, the book to write, the examination to prepare for. If the future looks dark, so did it on the morning before the first Christmas—and in the year 5000 B. C. And however dark it is, we shall meet life better if we have fulfilled the present to the best of our ability. Today is still ours, along with the obligation to live it to the full. As St. Francis said, we must go on hoeing our garden.

CURE Group Claims Sex Basic Cause Bitter Race Relations
Norfolk, Va. (ANP) — A new organization was recently formed here to explore an angle of race relations that has reportedly been ignored. The Committee Undoing Racial Evil, founded and headed by Mrs. Floretta Sears Thomas, is concerned with the sex angle of the problem of race relations.

The group holds that the underlying problem of race relations is sexual. It claims that only the Negro woman and the white man can do anything substantial about the problem because they are free here as the white woman and the Negro man are not free.
Mrs. Thomas and other CURE officers claim that the truth on race relations is kept from the people. What has been written on race mixing leaves untold the real issues involved in the handicaps American Negroes are suffering because of the dominance of the white man in the field of sex relations.

CURE officials claim that racial segregation is aimed only at the Negro man and the white man's scheme is to use this to protect his women while he is free to cross the line for Negro women. CURE officials say they plan a thorough study of this issue and that the truth will be found and given to the people whom they claim are kept in the dark by the white man and most Negro leaders.

Employment At 971,000 State Places 9,000 In Month
Nonfarm employment in Minnesota in November reached an all-time high for November at 971,000, according to Frank T. Starkey, Commissioner of Employment Security. While this total showed a seasonal drop of 9,300 from the October level, it represented a gain of 7,600 over November of last year, the first time in 1961 that current employment has been above year-ago figures. Indications are that employment this winter, while involving usual seasonal declines, should continue at levels higher than for the corresponding months last year.
